
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City map

When considering the city's monuments, museums, buildings, libraries, or famous residents, visitors are transported through time and space... Here are some monuments and areas not to be missed!

EIFFEL TOWER

The Eiffel Tower, undoubtedly the Paris landmark and mustsee monument, is 324 metres high and weighs a total of 10,000 tons. You can take the stairs or the lift up. There are souvenir shops on the first level, while the second level offers an opportunity to enjoy a gastronomic menu at the smart Jules Verne restaurant, 125 metres above ground level. Once you get to the third and final platform, you'll be up there among the clouds with an amazing 360-degree view of the city.

Access: Metro 6 Bir Hakeim

ORSAY MUSEUM

The museum was transferred to the old train station of Orsay and inaugurated in 1986. Most French Museums aim at presenting a wide range of artistic creations: namely paintings, sculptures, and graphic arts. The Orsay Museum displays a panorama of French and European art ranging from 1848 to 1914 Closed on Monday

Access : Metro 12 Assemblée Nationale

INVALIDES

Founded by Louis XIV to shelter 7,000 reformed soldiers, this establishment hosted wounded or disabled soldiers as well as all those who had 20 years of service (that's why it's called a hostel). The hostel is famous for its dome covered with more than 555,000 gold leaves. Behind the dome is the sarcophagus of Napoleon after it was transferred from Saint Helene in 1840.

Access: Metro 13 Invalides

NOTRE DAME DE PARIS / ILE DE LA CITÉ

The Ile de la Cité corresponds to the heart of Paris; it was the capital of Lutecium, its Medieval ancestor. The Ile de la Cité was the cradle of Gaul's lutetium and the birthplace of the Roman River Trade. which, from the 1st century onwards, has made the Parisian boaters wealthy. In the 9th century, small churches were built on the square in front of the cathedral to protect relics from Norman pillages.

Access: Metro 4 Cité

LATIN QUARTER / SAINT GERMAIN DES PRÈS

The Latin Quarter and the Saint Germain des Près area are filled with fascinating museums and overwhelming monuments: The Arabic World Institute, The Cluny Museum, The National Museum of Natural History of and the Jardin des plantes. This guarter symbolises the city's artistic and intellectual life. In fact during the twenties, the Saint Germain quarter was the favourite meeting place of students, artists and writers. Access: Metro 4 St-Germain des-Près / Odéon / Saint-Michel

CHAMPS ELYSÉES / ARC DE TRIOMPHE

The avenue links the Arc de Triomphe to La Concorde. It has been called the most beautiful avenue of the world. It is a district of offices, cinemas and restaurants. When looking at it from the top of the Arc de Triomphe, you will understand why the spot is called "étoile" or "star spot".

Access : Metro 6 Charles de Gaulle Etoile

PLACE DE LA CONCORDE

Place de la Concorde symbolized national reconciliation after the French Revolution. Louis Philippe wished to reunite republicans and royalists. He chose to raise in the middle of the place an obelisk from Luxor, a neutral monument, offered by Mohamed Ali. This obelisk comes from the Ramses II Temple. All the statues decorating the place represent 8 French big cities (Marseille, Lyon, Bordeaux, Nantes, Rouen, Brest, Lille and Strasbourg). Access: Metro 1 Concorde

LOUVRE MUSEUM

It is probably the biggest and the most famous museum in the world. The museum owns 7,000 European artistic works, and overall 300,000 artworks, of which 35,000 are displayed (the remaining others are drawings which cannot be exhibited for more than 3 months in a row for fear of damage). The museum is divided into 7 departments: Egyptians Antiques, Greeks antiques, Romans antiques, paintings, sculptures, art objects and graphic arts. Closed on Tuesday

Access: Metro 1-7 Louvre Rivoli

BASTILLE

The Bastille has a lot of importance to the French history. By crossing the Seine and following the Boulevard de la Bastille, you will find the site of the Bastille Saint-Antoine, which was a major part of the defences ordered by Charles V, built from 1370. Louis XIV had the ramparts demolished but kept the Bastille as a luxury prison for people of quality.

Access: Metro 1 Bastille

OPERA GARNIER

Built between 1875 and 1875 by Charles Garnier, the Opera of Paris is a baroque example of neoclassicism with its richly decorated facade, its monumental staircases and Italian-like hall. The opera is a music and dance academy devoted to performing arts.

Access: Metro 8-7 Opéra

MONTMARTRE / SACRÉ CŒUR

Montmartre is famous for its artists, and in particular for the 19th and 20th century painters who lived there (because the rent was cheap). At the top of the Montmartre hill, the Sacré Coeur offers a fantastic view of the city. The basilica is a pilgrimage place where the chaplains and Benedictine sisters welcome pilgrims and all Christians all year long. Access: Metro 2 Pigalle / Anvers

QUALBRANLY MUSEUM

The huge new museum dedicated to 'arts premiers' or the often-ignored arts of non-European civilizations is a colossal edifice on stilts that surprises with its deep colors and baroque forms. Reached via a long circular ramp, the permanent collection is divided into four continents (Africa, Asia, Americas and Oceania), separated by a large winding serpent or river. Closed on Monday

Access: Metro 9 Alma-Marceau

JARDIN DU LUXEMBOURG

Bordering Saint Germain des Prés and the Quartier Latin, the Luxembourg Garden was inspired from the gardens of Boboli, and ordered by the Queen Marie of Medicis who pined for the Florence she was born in. In this French garden, you will find many flower beds, an orchard, a big octagonal pond where children sail their small boats, the refreshing Medicis Fountain and many outdoor sculptures.

Access: RER B Luxembourg

BOIS DE BOULOGNE

The «bois» was next to become a very fashionable place for promenades. It was in 1852 that it was to become the property of the City and also from this same date that it takes its present form: this huge 846-hectare park today provides different possibilities for walks and many pleasant spots.

Access: Metro 1 Porte Maillot

VERSAILLES

The Palace of Versailles, known in French as the Château de Versailles, was the royal palace in Versailles for over one hundred years until the King moved back to Paris. It is still a symbol of absolute monarchy in France Don't miss the magical Grandes Eaux Musicales, when the fountains are set in action to music: on until 31 October this year. Closed on Monday
